HORSE INSPECTIONS AND EXAMINATIONS: PASSPORT CONTROLS

Horses entered in CSI 2* classes are required to be stabled in the FEI Stabling compounds. FEI passports or National passports are required for horses and must be presented at the inspection. **Stabling Fee \$250.**

Horses must be on the grounds and in the secured area no later than 4:00 pm, Thursday, April 22.

TRAINING COMPETITION

Table A – Art. 307

There will be a training period in the main arena with a course consisting of approximately eight obstacles including a combination. Each competitor is permitted a maximum of 90 seconds per horse. Dress is informal; boots, breeches, shirt and a hard hat must be worn.

Kentucky Health Regulations: All horses entering Kentucky must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued by your state of residence, signed by a licensed veterinarian who has examined your horse within the last 30 days, and stating the horse is free from symptoms of any infectious diseases or exposure thereto. Currently, and until further notice, horses arriving to Kentucky and the Park for shows and events from Texas will be required to test negative for “Piro” (Equine Piroplasmosis/*T. equigenitalis*). Any horses arriving from Texas without a negative test will be denied entry.

Expenses: The Organizing Committee is not responsible for any expenses of competitors, horses, owners, their employees or agents, and does not offer expense allowances or reimbursements.

Directions: The Kentucky Horse Park is located on Ironworks Pike, north of Lexington. From I-75, take Exit 120. From other highways, watch for Kentucky Horse Park signs. Enter main gate entrance of the park, watch for signs to stabling (or ask for directions from the gate attendant).

Kentucky Horse Park Rules:

Admission

- a. All exhibitors are required to pay a one-time \$5.00 parking fee upon arrival on park grounds. Exhibitors will receive an exhibitor parking pass that will allow them entry to the main parking lot for the remainder of that event.
- b. Exhibitors wishing to tour the Kentucky Horse Park may purchase reduced Park admission tickets at the Kentucky Horse Park Visitor Information Center.

Electrical Appliances

In compliance with the State of Kentucky Fire Code, the Kentucky Horse Park does NOT allow any of the following in stalls, barns or tents:

- a. any 2-prong plug appliances
- b. any 2-prong plug extension cords
- c. light duty cords for indoor use
- d. any 3-way adaptors unless specifically made for outdoors
- e. any adaptors without 3-prong connections

Parking/Traffic

- a. NO PARKING is permitted in the stabling areas, arenas, on the grass or in other designated NO PARKING areas. This will be enforced. Violators will be ticketed and towed.

- b. Exhibitors should park their empty trailers and horse vans in the marked areas in the main Kentucky Horse Park parking lot. Loading and unloading of vehicles in the stabling/show area is permitted.
- c. No trailer parking with electric or water hook-up is permitted in any of the barn or arena areas. Trailers and RVs requiring this service should make reservations with the Kentucky Horse Park Campground.
- d. Horses and carriages have the right of way on all roads and paths.
- e. The speed limit on all roads is 25 m.p.h. The speed limit in the barn areas and campground is 10 m.p.h. This is enforced by the Kentucky Horse Park Police.
- f. Hall of Champions Road is closed to all event traffic, including golf carts, mopeds, and bicycles. No event traffic should enter the main visitor area of the park.
- g. All drivers of any vehicles on the Park must be at least 16 years-of-age and have a valid driver's license. This includes golf carts, scooters, mopeds, etc.
- h. The Kentucky Horse Park reserves the right to revoke golf cart privileges from any exhibitor for violations or abuse.

Camping

- a. The Kentucky Horse Park Campground accepts reservations. Exhibitors should call Reserve America at 1-888-4KY-PARK (888-459-7275) or make reservations online at www.parks.ky.gov. Exhibitors wishing to make group reservations should contact the Kentucky Horse Park Campground at 859-259-4257.

Bedding

- a. Wood shavings and straw are considered acceptable forms of bedding.
- b. Bedding can be pre-ordered through Dever Show Services at 859-233-9702. Exhibitors should contact Dever Show Services at least 24 hours prior to their arrival to make arrangements.
- c. Exhibitors may also bring their own bedding with them.

Kentucky Horse Park Rules Continued: Muck

- a. The Kentucky Horse Park will clean all stalls prior to said event arrival and upon departure.
- b. All muck generated during event must be placed in marked muck bins. Muck should NOT be placed in the barns, at the ends of the barns, or in any other non-designated area. This is punishable by a fine.

Feed

- a. Feed and hay can be pre-ordered through Dever Show Services at 859-233-9702. Exhibitors should contact Dever Show Services at least 24 hours prior to their arrival.
- b. Exhibitors may also bring their own feed and hay.

Dogs

- a. Dogs are allowed on the show grounds.
- b. All dogs must be on a leash (not to exceed 6 ft. in length) and under control of handler at all times, or suitably restrained in a tack stall, etc. Local animal authorities will remove loose dogs at the owner's expense.
- c. Dogs in distress left in cars, trailers, etc., will be removed at the owner's expense.

Golf Carts

- a. The ability to have a golf cart is a privilege, not a right.
- b. Exhibitors wishing to bring their own private golf carts onto Kentucky Horse Park property must purchase a Golf Cart License. This license can be obtained at the Golf Cart Vendor Office for \$25/event or \$50/season.
- c. All drivers must be at least 16 years-of-age with a valid driver's license.
- d. Golf carts are strictly forbidden in all tourist areas of the park.
- e. Golf carts must obey all traffic laws and posted speed limits.
- f. Golf carts can be rented through Dever Show Services at 859-233-9702.
- g. **NO FOUR-WHEELERS, THREE-WHEELERS, OR MOTOR BIKES OVER 50 CC ARE ALLOWED ON PARK GROUNDS.** Golf carts, mopeds, rural rated vehicles such as Gators and Mules, scooters, small motor bikes, and bicycles are allowed.

WARNING

Under Kentucky law, a farm animal activity sponsor, farm animal professional, or other person does not have the duty to eliminate all risk of injury of participation in farm animal activities. There are inherent risks of injury that you voluntarily accept if you participate in farm animal activities.

Motorized Vehicles: Minors who do not have a valid driver's license which allows them to operate a motorized vehicle in the state in which they reside will not be permitted to operate a motorized vehicle of any kind including, but not limited to, golf carts, motorcycles, scooters, or farm utility vehicles on the competition grounds of licensed competitions. Minors who have a valid temporary license may operate the above described motorized vehicles as long as they are accompanied by an adult with a valid driver's license. Violations of this rule will be cause for sanctions against the parent(s), guardian(s) and/or trainer(s) who are responsible for the child committing the offense. Penalties may include exclusion of the child, parent(s), guardian(s), and/or trainer(s) from the competition grounds for the remainder of the competition and charges being filed against any of the above individuals in accordance with Chapter 6. Wheelchairs and other mobility assistance devices for individuals with disabilities are exempt from this rule.

Important notice to all affected parties: Third parties may come upon the property or enter the facilities where any herein described or listed event will occur; provided, that this is a license to enter the premises, for the purpose of observing or participating in the event, but not otherwise, and such license to any individual is subject to revocation by the owner, lessee or organizer, and entry for any purpose other than granted herein, shall be deemed criminal trespass and subject to appropriate legal proceedings.

ATTENTION COMPETITORS

Each competitor is responsible for supplying management with copies of correct association numbers (FEI, US Equestrian Federation, Equine Canada etc.) for horse, owner, rider and trainer with the submission of entries to the competition. The scores of competitors who fail to supply correct numbers may not be counted toward national awards.

Organizers Rights: The OC retains the right to split, cancel, or change the day of a class or to further restrict the number of horses a rider may ride in any one class, also to cancel the event under special circumstances with the permission of the US Equestrian Federation and the FEI, and return entry fees. Organizer also retains the right to secure a second FEI panel of judges if entries warrant.

Awards: Awards will be distributed to 25% of participants in each competition. Prize money will be mailed within 10 days of the conclusion of the competition. Riders are to appear formally attired and mounted for all award ceremonies.

Arenas: Competitions will take place in Main Outdoor Stadium which is irregularly shaped with maximum dimensions of 360' x 384'. The area is 121,000 square feet. The warm-up arena is 174' x 230'. Both arenas have OTTOsport surface of fine sand and synthetic fibers on pvc mats with sub surface drainage.

Insurances

Under the Equine Activity Liability Act, each participant who participates in an equine activity expressly assumes the risks of engaging in and legal responsibility for injury, loss, or damage to person or property resulting from the risk of equine activities.

All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date.

Weather/Acts of God/Accidents or Emergency Policy: Management reserves the right to cancel any classes due to hazardous weather, Acts of God, Accidents or Emergencies. Every effort will be made to reschedule with priority given to any Championship or qualifying classes being offered. No refunds for cancellations due to hazardous weather, Acts of God, Accidents or Emergencies.

Every effort is made to honor stabling requests but are not guaranteed. SMOKING IS FORBIDDEN IN THE BARN AND ADJACENT BARN AREAS.

THE FEI CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The Federation Equestre Internationale (FEI) expects all those involved in International Equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare mistake precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farrier and tack, and transportation.

Horses and athletes must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.

Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.

Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.

The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.

Liability Horses by their inherent nature present a risk. This show, the Kentucky Horse Park, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the World Equestrian Games Foundation, Inc, the management, the USEF Licensee, and the facility will not be responsible for any loss or damage or injury to horses exhibited, or for any article of any kind or nature that may be lost or destroyed, or in any way injured. Each exhibitor will be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned to any person, whomsoever, by any horse owned or exhibited by said exhibitor and shall indemnify the show, the management, the show committee and volunteers, the USEF Licensee, and the USEF or any member thereof, against all claims and demands, of any nature or kind, that may grow out of any injury occasioned by any horses owned or exhibited by them, or arise from the negligence of the person in charge of any such horse. All horses exhibited in this show participate entirely at the owner's risk.

Neither the Organizing Committee, show volunteers and staff, the facility or its owners, the Kentucky Horse Park, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the World Equestrian Games Foundation, Inc, any host GMO, USEF or USDF or their members will be responsible for any damage, injury, or loss to persons, horses, or property of exhibitors or spectators. All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date.

Life, senior active and junior active members shall be eligible to participate in all classes at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions at the Preliminary Level or above and Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level, Dressage, Reining and Vaulting Competitions and Endurance Rides. A nonmember may participate as a handler, rider, driver, owner, lessee, agent, coach or trainer at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions, Dressage Competitions, Reining Competitions and Combined Driving Competitions upon payment of a 30 nonmember registration fee. Participants in the following classes are exempted from the requirements of this rule: 1) leadline 2) exhibitions 3) games and races 4) classes for 4-H members 5) walk trot and academy classes (academy classes are classes limited to horses used regularly in a lesson program) USDF introductory level tests, pas de deux and quadrille classes 7) NRHA Endorsed Reining Competitions. 8) Opportunity classes, 9) citizens of other nations who have proof, in English, of current membership in good standing of their own National Federation, 10) USEA beginner novice division and 11) assistant handlers in Dressage Sport Horse Breeding classes.
